He married, 1st, Nicolas, eldest daughter of sir John Grierfon of Lag, by whom he had only one daughter, Marjory, married to David fifth viscount Stormont, to whom she had a numerous issue, *viz.* David the sixth viscount, William lord Mansfield, &c. &c.

He married, 2dly, Elifabeth, daughter of John Ellies of Ellieston, Esq; advocate, by whom he had only one son,

David, his heir,—and two daughters.

1. Marjory, married to Peter Ogilvy younger of Balfour, in Forfarshire, and had issue.

2. Elifabeth, married to Alexander earl of Balcarras, without issue.

He died in the 73d year of his age, anno 1718, and was succeeded by his son,

VIII. DAVID SCOT of Scottstarvit, a man of good parts, great integrity and merit. He was bred to the law, and an advocate before the court of session.

He was a most useful member of society, and dextrous at composing differences and preventing law-suits amongst friends and neighbours, being often chosen sole arbiter in submissions, by both parties.

He was long a member of the British parliament, and continued one till his death.

He married Lucy, daughter of sir Robert Gordon of Gordonston, baronet, by whom he had two sons and two daughters.

1. David, his heir.

2. Colonel John Scot of Balcomie, who now represents the county of Fife in this present parliament 1768.

1st daughter, Elifabeth, married to Peter Hay of Leys, Esq; an ancient cadet of the illustrious house of Errol, and had issue.

2. Lucy, died unmarried.

He died at London, anno 1766, and was succeeded by his eldest son,

IX. DAVID SCOT, now of Scottstarvit, Esq; who appears to be the last cadet of the illustrious house of Buckleugh, in a direct male-line, consequently heir-male of that most noble family.

LEITH of LEITH-HALL.

THE surname of LEITH is of great antiquity in Scotland, and it is the opinion of some antiquaries, that they are of French extraction.

Certain it is, they had considerable possessions in lands in the county of Mid-Lothian, in very very early times, particularly the barony of Restalrig and several others in the territory of Leith, from which last place, 'tis thought, they assumed their surname.

Sir George Mackenzie, Mr Nisbet, &c. mention the Leiths of Restalrig as a very ancient family. The Logans of Restalrig are said to have obtained these lands by marrying with a daughter of the Leiths; and sir Robert Logan of Restalrig was lord high admiral of Scotland in the reign of king Robert III. &c.

At what period the Leiths settled in the north, we cannot precisely tell; but we find sir Norman Lesly progenitor of the earls of

Rothes, who lived in the reign of king Alexander III. married Elifabeth Leith, a daughter of the family of Edingarrock in Aberdeenshire, &c.

The immediate ancestor of this family was

I. WILLIAM LEITH, designed of Barns, a man of rank and distinction, who lived in the reign of king David Bruce, and was said to be male representative of the Leiths of Edingarrock. He was provost of Aberdeen, anno 1350, and went up to England with the hostages for king David's ransom, anno 1358.

He was proprietor also of the lands of Caprington, &c. in Aberdeenshire, and married a daughter of Donald twelfth earl of Marr, (omitted in the Peerage, page 460;) and, in consequence of this marriage, he had the cross crosslets (being part of the arms of that noble family) added to his own armorial bearing.

By this lady he had two sons.

1. *Laurence*, his heir.
2. *John*, a man of extraordinary parts and merit, who was often sent ambassador to the court of England to negotiate affairs of state, particularly in 1412, 1413, 1416, and was at last appointed one of the commissioners to settle the ransom for king James I.'s liberty, anno 1423. But we can give no account of his posterity.

William died in the reign of king Robert II, and was interred in the church of Aberdeen, where his monument, name, and arms are still to be seen, the arms being the same as carried by the Leiths of Leith-hall at this day, as matriculated in the Lyon-office, and blazoned at the end of these memoirs.

He was succeeded in his estate in Aberdeenshire by his eldest son,

II. **LAURENCE** of Barnis, who got a charter of confirmation from Adam bishop of Aberdeen the superior, *Laurentio de Leith, filio et heredi quondam Willielmi Leith, totas terras de Caprington, cum pertinentiis jacen. in vicecomitat. de Aberdeen, &c.* dated 6th April 1388.

He was provost of Aberdeen in the years 1401, 1403, and 1411. He made a present to that town of their largest bell, on which his name is still to be seen.

He died in the reign of king James II. and was buried in the church of Aberdeen, where his name and the same armorial bearing with his father's are still extant.

He left a son,

III. **NORMAN LEITH**, who succeeded him in all his lands.

He married Elisabeth, daughter of William Leslie fourth baron of Balquhain by Agnes Irvine his wife, daughter of the baron of Drum, by whom he had three sons.

1. *Henry*, his heir.
2. *Gilbert*, of whom there is no succession; but he will be further mentioned in the next title.
3. *John*, progenitor of the Leiths of Overhall. *Vide* that title.

He died in the reign of king James III. and was succeeded by his eldest son,

IV. **HENRY LEITH**, who was proprietor of many other lands besides those of Barnis. This appears by a charter under the great seal from king James IV. *Henrico Leith de Barnis, terrarum de Barnis, Auchlevoen, Ardoun cum molendino, Harlaw, &c. &c.* in Aberdeenshire, dated 18th July 1490.

He left issue three sons.

1. *George*, his heir.

2. *William Leith* of Edingarrock, who carried on the line of this family, as will be shown hereafter.

3. *Patrick*, progenitor of the Leiths of Harthill. *Vide* that title.

He died before the year 1479, and was succeeded by his eldest son,

V. **GEORGE LEITH** of Barnis, who married, and left issue only two daughters, between whom he divided his lands of Barnis.

1. *Elisabeth*, married to Mr John Forbes of Towie, whose son William got a charter under the great seal from queen Mary, "To William Forbes, son and apparent heir of Elisabeth Leith portioner of Barnis, of part of the lands of Barnis, &c." dated 5th December 1550.

2. *Janet*, married, 1st, to Alexander Seton of Meldrum; 2dly, to Alexander Gordon of Aberzeldie, and had issue to both.

George of Barnis dying without sons, anno 1505, the representation in the male-line devolved upon his brother William before-mentioned, to whom we now return.

V. **WILLIAM LEITH**, second son of Henry of Barnis, acquired the lands of Edingarrock, &c. from George Leslie of that ilk, and got a charter from the said George in these words: *Noveritis me vendidisse, &c. dilecto meo Willielmo Leith filio secundo genito quondam Henrici Leith domini de Barnis, omnes et singulas terras meas dimidietatis occidentalis ville de Edingarrock, &c. jacen. in regalitate de Garioch et vicecomitatu de Aberdeen, &c.* dated the last day of January 1499.

He married a daughter of ——— Gordon of Strathdon, by whom he had two sons.

1. *Patrick*, his apparent heir.
2. *George*, who carried on the line of the family.

As this William often resided at Likliehead, being part of his estate of Edingarrock, his posterity were sometimes promiscuously designed by both these titles.

VI. **PATRICK**, eldest son and apparent heir of William, upon his father's resignation, got a charter under the great seal, *Patricio Leith, dimidietat. ville et terrarum de Edingarrock, &c.* dated 14th May 1516; but he dying without issue, was succeeded by his brother,

VI. **GEORGE LEITH** of Edingarrock, second son of William, who was served and returned heir-male to his uncle George Leith of Barnis, before John Leslie of Balquhain

sheriff of Aberdeen, and an inquest of fifteen of the best gentlemen of the country, one of whom was William Leith portioner of Barnis his cousin, who was son of John third son of Norman of Barnis, &c.

The retour bears, that George Leslie of Edingarrock is nearest and lawful heir-male of the deceased George Leith of Barnis his uncle, &c.

The service, at which several of the seals of the gentlemen of the inquest are still entire, is dated 13th January 1550.

He lived to a great age, died in the end of the reign of queen Mary, and was succeeded by his son,

VII. PATRICK LEITH, who, in his father's lifetime, was designed of Likliehead.

He married Jean, second daughter of William Leslie seventh baron of Balquhain by Elisabeth his wife, daughter of sir Walter Ogilvie of Boyne, by whom he had four sons and two daughters.

1. Patrick, his heir.

2. John, designed of Edingarrock, who married a daughter of John Leslie of Wardis, but died without male-issue.

3. Laurence of Kirkton of Rain, who carried on the line of this family, of whom afterwards.

4. Henry, mentioned in an entail hereafter narrated, but we can give no further account of him.

1st daughter, Nicolas, married to George Leslie fourth laird of Finrassie.

2. Margaret, married to Stephen Leslie fourth laird of Warthill.

This Patrick, in his father's lifetime, acquired the lands of Kirkton of Rain from his brother-in-law John Leslie of Balquhain, upon whose resignation he got a charter from the archdean of Aberdeen in the following terms: *Patricio Leith de Likliehead in vitali redditu, et Johanni Leith ejus filio secundo genito in feodo et hereditate, et hereditibus masculis de corpore dicti Johannis legitime procreandis; quibus deficien. Laurentio Leith filio dicti Patricii, hereditibus masculis, &c. quibus deficien. Henrico Leith, etiam filio dicti Patricii, hereditibus masculis, &c. totas et integras terras meas ecclesiasticas, vocat. Kirkton de Rayn, Alehousecroft ejusd. cum suis pertinen. jacen. in parochia de Rayn et vicecomitat. de Aberdeen, &c. dated 13th August 1551; to which Patrick Leith of Harthill is a witness.*

Patrick is also served heir to the deceased George Leith his father, in the lands of Edingarrock, before John Leslie of Balquhain sheriff of Aberdeen, and a very honourable inquest of fifteen gentlemen. The retour

bears, that Patrick Leith bearer hereof is nearest and lawful heir of unquhil George his father in the foresaid lands, &c. The service is dated 4th October 1580, to which the seals of most of the gentlemen of the inquest are still intire.

He died in the end of the reign of king James VI. and was succeeded by his eldest son,

VIII. PATRICK LEITH of Edingarrock, who was served and returned heir to his father Patrick by a precept from the chancery, dated 19th November 1625, with a sasine following thereon, &c.

Immediately thereafter he sold his lands of Edingarrock and Likliehead to John Forbes of Leslie.

He was afterwards infeft in the lands of Innogathill, upon a precept of *clare constat* from George marquis of Huntly, as heir to William Leith of Edingarrock his great-grandfather, May 1629.

He dying soon thereafter, without issue, was succeeded by his next surviving brother,

VIII. LAURENCE LEITH of Kirkton of Rain, third son of Patrick of Likliehead, who got a charter of confirmation under the great seal, *Laurentio Leith, hereditibus masculis, &c. quibus deficien. Henrico de Leith ejus fratri, &c.* (precisely in terms of the entail before narrated) *terrarum ecclesiasticarum, vocat. Kirkton de Rayn, cum gleba, &c. dated 3d November 1581.*

This Laurence wadset from the marquis of Huntly the lands of Bucharn, where he chiefly resided afterwards. He also purchased a considerable part of the parish of Colbrack.

He married, 1st, Agnes, third daughter of Alexander third laird of Wardis by Margaret his wife, daughter of Alexander Forbes of Towie; but by her he had no issue.

He married, 2dly, Bessie, daughter of sir George Gordon of Cocklarochie, by whom he had a son,

IX. JOHN, who succeeded him in his whole estate, but sold off his lands of Kirkton de Rain; and, as he resided for the most part at Bucharn, he was chiefly designed by that title, until he purchased the lands of New Leslie, Peill, Syde, Arnbog, &c. after which New Leslie became the seat of his family, and he was for sometime designed by that title.

He married Marjory, daughter of Arthur Forbes, fourth son of Alexander sixth lord Pitligo, by Margaret his wife, daughter of Alexander

I. **PATRICK**, third son of Henry Leith of Barnis, No. IV. of title LEITH of Leith-hall, was the first of this family.

He got from his father the lands of Harthill, &c. and married Clara, daughter of John Leslie second baron of Wardes, which is instructed by a charter under the great seal from king James V. *Patricio Leith de Harthill, et Clara Leslie ejus sponsa, terrarum de Auchleven, Ardoun, Buchanstown cum molendino, Harlaw, &c.* in the county of Aberdeen, dated 8th December 1531.

By her he had a son,

John, his heir,—and a daughter,

Christina, who got a charter under the great seal from queen Mary, *Christina Leith, filia Patricii Leith de Harthill in vitali reddito, terrarum de lie Intoun de Knockreoch, &c.* dated 10th February 1547.

He died in the end of the reign of queen Mary, and was succeeded by his son,

II. **JOHN LEITH** of Harthill, who married Beatrix Frazer, by whom he had three sons and one daughter.

1. *Patrick*, his heir.

2. *Peter*, who married Elisabeth, daughter of William Udney of that ilk, Esq; and obtained from his father a charter of the lands of Muirhillock, Lonehead, mill of Bonnytown, &c. to him and Elisabeth Udney his spouse, dated 22d September 1605.

3. *George*, who, anno 1605, married Helen, daughter of John Leith of Mountgerry, and was progenitor of the Leiths of Treesfield.

His daughter, *Magdalene*, was married to George Leith of Barnis.

He got a charter under the great seal, *Johanni Leith de Harthill, filio et heredi quondam Patricii Leith de Harthill, viginti solidat. villa et terrarum de Newlands in vicecomitatu de Aberdeen, &c. &c.* dated the penult day of July 1599.

He lived to a great age, died about the year 1612, and was succeeded by his eldest son,

III. **PATRICK LEITH** of Harthill, who, upon his father's resignation, got a charter under the great seal, *Patricio Leith, filio et heredi apparenti Johannis Leith, senioris de Harthill, terrarum ecclesiasticarum de lie Kirk-toun de Rain, cum lie Alebouse-croft ejusd. &c.* in the county of Aberdeen, dated 3d March 1611.

He married ———, daughter of ———, by whom he had issue two sons:

1. *Patrick*, his heir.

2. *John*, who carried on the line of the family, of whom afterwards.

He died in the beginning of the reign of king Charles I. and was succeeded by his eldest son,

IV. **PATRICK LEITH** of Harthill, a youth of extraordinary parts, undaunted resolution, and most inviolably attached to the interest of the royal family: According to my author, "he was deservedly honoured with a commission for a troop of horse from king Charles I. He knew well how to raise the men; but the great difficulty was, how to mount them: His military genius and heroic spirit soon surmounted this obstacle, by forming a stratagem that succeeded to his wish; for, hearing that Forbes of Craigyvar had come to Inverury with his troop, he called to him his most bold and enterprising friends, and, after communicating his plan, went with them in dead of night to Inverury, where he made the whole troop prisoners, and with their horses mounted his own men, with whom, in a day or two he made a good figure before Montrose, who highly applauded the courage and conduct of the brave young gentleman, &c. &c." But he had the misfortune afterwards to be taken prisoner by the parliament forces, and was beheaded at Edinburgh, 26th October 1647, not above 25 years of age; and having no issue was succeeded by his brother,

IV. **JOHN LEITH** of Harthill, second son of Patrick, who married Jean Forbes, daughter of ———, by whom he had a son,

William, his heir,—and a daughter, *Anne*.

He was also deeply engaged in the royal cause, tho' but a young man, and on that account suffered great hardships; which appears from the records of parliament, by a petition and representation of "John Leith of Harthill, Jean Forbes his spouse, and Anne Leith their daughter, setting forth, that he was tane in Lesmoir's house anno 1647, with others, on capitulation for freedom of life and fortune, which was observed to all that were taken except himself: That he has ever since layn in the iron-house in a miserable condition in the tolbuith of Edinburgh, &c. &c. Afterwards, upon a motion of the earl of Lothian, he was ordered to be liberate, he finding caution in the

JOHNSTON of WAMPFRAY.

THE immediate ancestor of this family was

JAMES JOHNSTON, lord of that ilk, the tenth generation of the illustrious house of Annandale in a direct male-line.

He lived in the reigns of king James IV. and V. and left issue four sons.

1. *John*, who succeeded him, and carried on the line of the family of Annandale.

His other sons were *Robert*, *Adam*, and —.

I. JAMES, the first of this family.

This James having acquired from John Carruthers of Holmains, the lands of Aldtoun, and others near Moffat, extending to a five merks land of old extent, got a charter of alienation thereof from the said John Carruthers, *Honorabili viro Jacobo Johnston, fratri germano honorabilis viri Johannis Johnston de eodem, &c.* dated 16th November 1546.

He afterwards got a charter under the great seal from queen Mary, *Jacobo Johnston in Porconnet, terrarum baronia de Wamphray, Margareta Maclellan ejus sponsa, et Jacobo Johnston ejus filio et heredi apparenti, &c.* dated anno 1549, which barony became afterwards the chief title of his family.

As in those days there were frequent incursions made by the English borderers in the south country, and sometimes family feuds amongst themselves, there was a mutual and very natural contract or bond of manrent entered into betwixt John Johnston lord of that ilk, and James Johnston of Wamphray, his brother-german, in which are these words :

“ That the said James Johnston of Wamphray, binds and obliges him, and his ayrs, in perpetual bond of manrent to the said John, and his heirs, to serve him and them, lalely and truly, both with his body and guid counsel against all persons, his allegi-

“ ance to the crown allenary excepted; and
“ the said John Johnston of that ilk, binds
“ and obliges him, and his ayrs, that he shall
“ maintain and defend the said James, and his
“ ayrs, in all the lawful actions, causes and
“ quarrels, lawful and honest against all per-
“ sons, his allegiance to the crown allenary
“ excepted, &c. &c.” This deed is duly executed and signed by the parties at Dumfries, the 12th day of April 1550, before these witnesses, James Douglas of Drumlanrig, Alexander Carlisle of Bride-Kirk, Thomas Johnston of Craigsburn, Adam Carlisle, &c. &c. and registrate in the commissary court books of Dumfries.

By the said Margaret, daughter of sir Thomas Maclellan of Bomby, ancestor of lord Kirkcubright, he had issue two sons.

1. *James*, his heir.

2. *Gilbert*, who carried on the line of this family.

He was succeeded by his eldest son,

II. JAMES JOHNSTON of Wamphray, who survived his father many years; but dying without issue, anno 1591, was succeeded by his brother,

II. GILBERT JOHNSTON of Wamphray, who is documented by a precept furth of the chancery, to and in favours of “ Gilbert Johnston of Wamphray, heir served and retoured to James Johnston of Wamphray his brother-german, in all and hail the lands and barony of Wamphray, with the teinds and patronage of the rectory of Wamphray, and all churches and chapels belonging thereto, &c.” The precept is dated the 1st, and the sasine the 2d day of May 1593.
