## LEITH of LEITH-HALL.

'HE sirname of LEITH is of great antiquity in Scotland, and it is the opinion of fome antiquaries, that they are of French extraction.

Certain it is, they had confiderable poffeffions in lands in the county of Mid-Lothian, in very very early times, particularly the barony of Restalrig and several others in the territory of Leith, from which last place, 'tis thought, they assumed their sirname.

Sir George Mackenzie, Mr Nisbet, &c. mention the Leiths of Restalrig as a very antient family. The Logans of Restalrig are faid to have obtained these lands by marrying with a daughter of the Leiths; and fir Robert Logan of Restalrig was lord high admiral of Scotland in the reign of king Robert III. 6.c.

ALEXANDER LEITH, Efq; fecond fon of James of Leith-hall, acquired from George Leith of Treefield, with confent of his fon Peter, the lands of Treefield, Bonnytoun, and mill thereof, by a disposition, dated 26th January 1702; and having also made several other purchases, got a charter under the great seal, of the lands of Treefield, New Rain, Barreldykes, &c. &c. all erected into one free barony, to be called the barony of Freefield in all time coming, which hath continued to

be the chief title of his family ever fince. This charter is dated 26th January 1705.

He married Christian, daughter of Alexander Davidson of Newton, by whom he had four sons.

II. ALEXANDER LEITH, first of Glenkindy, now of Freefield, who was served and retoured heir to his father by a precept from the chancery, dated 26th April 1756.

# JOHNSTON of WAMPHRAY.

THE immediate ancestor of this family

JAMES JOHNSTON, lord of that ilk, the tenth generation of the illustrious house of Annandale in a direct male-line.

He lived in the reigns of king James IV.

and V. and left iffue four fons.

1. John, who succeeded him, and carried on the line of the samily of Annandale.

His other fons were Robert, Adam, and -.

I. JAMES, the first of this family.

This James having acquired from John Carruthers of Holmains, the lands of Aldtoun, and others near Mossat, extending to a five merks land of old extent, got a charter of alienation thereof from the said John Carruthers, Honorabilis viro Jacobo Johnston, fratri germano honorabilis viri Johannis Johnston de eodem, &c. dated 16th November 1546.

He afterwards got a charter under the great feal from queen Mary, Jacobo Johnston in Porconnel, terrarum bareniz de Wamphray, Margaretz Maclellan ejus sponse, et Jacobo Johnston ejus silio et haredi apparenti, &c. dated anno 1549, which barony became afterwards

the chief title of his family.

As in those days there were frequent incursions made by the English borderers in the south country, and sometimes family seuds amongst themselves, there was a mutual and very natural contract or bond of manrent entered into betwixt John Johnston lord of that ilk, and James Johnston of Wamphray, his brother-german, in which are these words:

"That the said James Johnston of Wam-" phray, binds and obliges him, and his ayrs, in perpetual bond of manrent to the said John, and his heirs, to serve him and them, lalely and truly, both with his body and guid counsel against all persons, his allegi-

"ance to the crown allenarly excepted; and the faid John Johnston of that ilk, binds and obliges him, and his ayrs, that he fall mentain and defend the faid James, and his ayrs, in all the lawful actions, causes and quarrels, lawful and honest against all perfons, his allegiance to the crown allenarly excepted, &c. &c." This deed is duly execute and signed by the parties at Dumfries, the 12th day of April 1550, before these witnesses, James Douglas of Drumlanrig, Alexander Carlisle of Bride-Kirk, Thomas Johnston of Craigsburn, Adam Carlisle, &c. &c. and registrate in the commissary court books of Dumfries.

By the faid Margaret, daughter of fir Thomas Maclellan of Bomby, anceftor of lord Kirkcudbright, he had iffue two fons.

1. James, his heir.

2. Gilbert, who carried on the line of this amily.

He was fucceeded by his eldeft fon,

II. JAMES JOHNSTON of Wamphray, who furvived his father many years; but dying without iffue, anno 1591, was fucceeded by his brother,

II. GILBERT JOHNSTON of Wamphray, who is documented by a precept furth of the chancery, to and in favours of "Gilbert John-" fton of Wamphray, heir ferved and retour-" ed to James Johnston of Wamphray his brother-german, in all and haill the lands and barony of Wamphray, with the teinds and patronage of the rectory of Wamphray, and all churches and chapels belonging thereto, &c." The precept is dated the 1st, and the fasine the 2d day of May 1593.
